The money available comes out of Foster Care budget.</p> | <p>Individual kids served in FY '14 was 466.</p> <p>Depends on need & avail general fund dollars.</p> | <p>Determined by the Child & Family Services Division Social Worker; allowed 111 hours per year per child (not family). No assessment tools or criteria.</p> | <p>Foster families are responsible for finding/hiring individuals as respite care providers; typically use extended family (60%) or other foster families; approved by the caseworker; Therapeutic foster parents must use other therapeutic foster parents for respite.</p> | <p>No training required</p> <p>No background checks required (plans to review this).</p> | <p>\$4.00 per hour max \$32 per 24 hour day max We pay foster family and they pay the caregiver.</p> |

(This is actually 2 DD Waivers and 1 Children's Autism Waiver)</p> | <p>500 families</p> | <p>Provider agency along with case manager assessment; no cap or requirement to use hrs.</p> | <p>Self-directed or agency based; licensed daycare</p> | <p>Basic First Aid</p> <p>Agency based requires background checks.</p> | <p>\$13.48/hr 1 to 1 ratio</p> <p>Self-Direct MAY BE exempt from paying minimum wage; a weekend may cost \$100 or \$200</p> |

Collaboration between CFSD and HRD.</p> | <p>Approx. \$200,000 – State general funds for regular respite; Over spent last year. Unsure of how respite is billed.</p> | | <p>Determined by treatment plan – up to 48 hours per month; usually used in a crisis; can be creative with ideas for respite.</p> | <p>The Therapeutic Foster Family locates a respite care provider, generally another licensed Therapeutic Foster Family, or some other person who is qualified to provide respite services given the unique needs of the child. Also have trained facilities 24/7 used for crisis respite.</p> | <p>1915i State Plan pays \$200/day to provider</p> | |

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| <p>Senior & Long Term care (SLTC)/Aging Services</p> <p>Contact:</p> <p>Kerrie Reidelbach 444-0998</p> <p>Jackie Stoeckel 444-6061</p> | <p>Seniors over age 60; grandparents 55 yrs of age or older who are providing care to grandchildren 18 yrs of age or younger; any caregiver providing care to a person with Alzheimer's disease, regardless of age; a parent who is 60 yrs of age or older who has a child with a disability who resides with the parent.</p> | <p>\$520,000 – Title III and the National family Caregiver Support Program from the Administration on Aging.</p> | <p>400</p> | <p>Determined by local provider based on demand and funds available; up to each county if respite is put in the budget.</p> | <p>Agency based; contracts with nursing homes, assisted living facilities or other providing agencies</p> | <p>Limited training in some areas through AAA's. Some have attempted to use volunteers though they limit what they are willing to do. Havre currently provides consumer specific training as needed. For emergency respite they refer to providers with trained PCA workers.</p> | <p>Determined by provider. Some charge and have cost sharing.</p> |

Caregiver, consumer and family decides.</p> | <p>Self-Directed or agency based; HCBS contracts with Assisted Living Facilities or Skilled Nursing Facilities to provide flexible and individualized respite care.</p> | <p>Training provided by the provider agency or consumer. (40+ services provided)</p> | <p>Rates set by HCBS Fee Sched: \$3.32 - \$4.24 per 15 min/ Assist. Living & Adult Foster care \$164.89 per day/Hospital \$360 per day and Nursing</p> |
